



What is Worklaw[®] Network?

Worklaw Network is the international network of law firms representing management exclusively in all areas of labor and employment law. Each member firm is a labor and employment “boutique.” All we do is employment and labor law, so we have to be quite good at it.

Why is Worklaw Network a better choice? Are you just a big law firm?

Worklaw Network offers employers the benefits of a large, multi-national law firm without the drawbacks. Worklaw firms are not small departments contained within massive general practice firms, nor are they outposts of national firms which often have high associate to partner ratios and high turnover rates:

What rates do you charge? How is billing handled?

Each firm charges its own local rates and prepares its own bills. Although the great majority of Worklaw lawyers are experienced, partner-level lawyers with a wealth of experience, because of the size and efficiency of our member firms, total fees are very favorable in comparison to the large firms.

If the client desires, we can set up a single point of contact and a coordinated billing system.

How do you decide which firm handles the work?

The work will go to the firm with an office in the jurisdiction. In the states where there is no office but there are lawyers licensed to practice, we will route work to the firm with the relevant experience or expertise. We can also help people find counsel in the states where we do not have Worklaw Network lawyers.
